

Campus Security Authorities (CSA) – Clery Act One-Sheet

The safety of our university community is USC's top priority. As a CSA, you play an active part in campus safety.

The Jeanne Clery Campus Safety Act (Clery Act) is a federal consumer protection act designed to increase transparency around campus crime policy and statistics to help current and prospective students and employees to make informed decisions about their safety. It requires the university to disclose certain crime statistics and safety information in its [Annual Security and Fire Safety Report](#). As a CSA, you are responsible to report Clery Act Crimes occurring on Clery Act Geography for inclusion in this report.

Property that is considered by the Clery Act to be (1) on campus, (2) public property within or immediately adjacent to campus, or (3) non-campus buildings or property the university or a recognized student organization owns, controls, or leases, is frequented by students, and is used in support of educational purposes for each of USC's campuses (as defined by the Clery Act).

Clery Act Crimes

Certain crimes, when reported, might require notification to the university community, include:

- Homicide (murder and negligent/non negligent manslaughter)
- Sex offenses (rape, fondling, statutory rape, and incest)
- Robbery
- Aggravated Assault
- Burglary
- Motor vehicle theft
- Arson
- Hate crimes
- VAWA (dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking)
- Hazing
- Arrests and referrals for disciplinary action for liquor law, drug law, and weapons law violations
